Poverty in DuPage County is Rising Dramatically

Approximately 70,000 people in DuPage County have incomes under the federal poverty level! That's only \$23,050 for a family for four. And nearly another 178,000 of our neighbors are considered lower income, living with less than \$46,100 for a family of the same size. [source: DuPage Federation]

It's a startling figure. Historically, the suburbs have had far less need and little public support for crucial human services to help people living in poverty. However, demographic changes have brought on an unprecedented level of need here in DuPage County. And the human services being offered simply cannot handle the overload.

Let's raise our voices! Join us on Sunday, September 15, as we hold a missions fair in the gymnasium, entitled, "Faith in Action - Helping our Neighbors." The fair will offer an array of informational and volunteer booths from fantastic local organizations and our own DGFUMC initiatives. Bridge Board - DGFUMC

For 13 years, Bridge Board members have mentored families from being homeless to independent living. The two-year commitment for mentors and the family – usually a single parent with children –provides clients with temporary housing, guidance, love, and stability. Missions Work Area - DGFUMC

The MWA strives to make God's love known in the lives of our neighbors: locally, nationally, and globally. In addition to donations, the MWA works locally to help our neighbors: distribution of tomato and pepper plants so that members of the congregation can raise fresh produce for clients of the PRC Westmont food pantry and provided gift cards to local elementary school staff to help purchase nutritional snacks for hungry children. PADS - Public Action to Deliver Shelter

PADS provides emergency services for more than 1,200 homeless men, women, and children in DuPage County. Although the mission is to end homelessness (through case management, life coaching, employment support), a principal activity is to coordinate a network of sites to give temporary food and shelter. Our church hosts individuals and families every Tuesday night from Oct. to May. DGFUMC volunteers coordinate the program and work on the first Tuesday of each month, while other churches work on the remaining weeks. Contact: Diane Kerr.

CROP Hunger Walk - October 20, 2013

Participants have raised nearly \$600,000 over the past 25 years in support of the grassroots, hunger-fighting development efforts of Church World Service (CWS) partner agencies in more than 80 countries. The Walk helps to provide tools of hope that empower people to meet their own needs...seeds and tools, water systems, technical training and micro-enterprise loans. Of the total funds raised, 25% of the dollars come back to support local hunger agencies, including Walk-In Ministry of Hope, Northern Illinois Food Bank, People's Resource Center (Westmont pantry) and PADS sites. PRC meets basic needs, including food, clothing, and rent assistance, and offers skill-building resources, such as literacy classes, job assistance, computer training and art. More than 32,000 DuPage residents rely on PRC for help each year. Over 1,500 volunteers work with the small PRC staff offering time, skills and resources to help their neighbors. Donors contribute food, clothing, books, computers, and money to support the PRC's work. Sharing Connections Furniture Bank provides donated furniture and household items to low-income families, most of whom are coping with crisis like domestic violence, job loss, or financial hardship and include the previously homeless, unemployed and working poor, veterans, victims of domestic violence, immigrants, individuals with mental or physical disabilities, victims of fire, flood and natural disasters, etc. Clients have housing, but are faced with the harsh reality that their "home" is empty or severely under-furnished. The average salary of a client family of four is approximately \$12,400 a year. After basic expenses are paid, there's little if anything left for the common household furnishings most take for granted.

The vision of the Food Bank is for no one to be hungry in northern Illinois and to lead the community in solving hunger by providing nutritious meals to those in need. Across 13 northern Illinois counties, food manufacturers, local groceries, corporations, foundations, and individuals come together to donate food and funds, and evaluate and repack food for distribution to more than 600 network partners – the food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters and youth and senior feeding programs that serve more than 60,000 different people each week.

The Service was founded in 1976 by a group of concerned individuals who wanted to help the growing number of individuals in DuPage County made homeless by domestic abuse. Now it provides emergency shelter services and non-residential counseling services, children's programs, support groups, court advocacy, hotline services and preventative education. Volunteers can help with light maintenance, childcare, working in one of the two resale shops, as well as helping at fundraising events.

AHK provides short-term transitional and respite care in a home-like setting to medically fragile children with complicated health needs, as well as training for their families. Many client families rely on financial donations and state aide in order to receive services. The children are often depending on a ventilator for breathing support, a feeding tube for nutrition and the use of other hi-tech devices. Family members are taught how to operate the equipment before the child goes home. The facility in Naperville is the only model of its kind in Illinois. Volunteers spend time with the children and represent the organization at special events.

Formerly known as the Walk-In Ministry of Hope, this organization provides emergency assistance to those in desperate need who include the unemployed, underemployed, homeless, seniors and disabled...nearly 15,000 individuals and their families in Downers Grove and five neighboring villages. After determining their immediate needs through compassionate conversation, clients are helped with either food, medical, dental and/or transportation vouchers, plus a clear pathway into the network of social agencies that can assist them with the long-term restructuring of their lives.

We are committed to raising our young adults with hearts and minds devoted to helping others. There are three main areas of focus in missions: awareness, fundraising and hands-on volunteering. Among events to address these goals are the 30 Hour Famine weekend (to learn about hunger, raise funds to help the hungry, and then go hungry themselves) and volunteer/ fundraising opportunities with PADS, the PRC, or Feed My Starving Children. Special trips are an opportunity for handson involvement. The Junior High Mission Trip is more locally focused, as they travel to Rogers Park every summer to help run a day camp and provide a program, modeled after vacation bible school, for underprivileged children. The Senior High Mission Trip travels to a different state (Kentucky, West Virginia and Michigan in the last three years) each summer to assist people, who cannot afford to hire anyone, with home repair, painting, even building a new porch or putting on a new roof.
